JUSTICE FOR MIGRANT CARE WORKERS

Thousands of racialized women come to Canada every year to take care of children, sick and the elderly. They are on tied permits, which means they can't change jobs, they often live in the homes of their employers and are separated from their own families. These restrictions are a breeding ground for exploitation.

Recent changes have made applying for Permanent Residency (PR) even harder:

- Language test score requirements are higher for PR than for citizenship
- Education accreditation is now required and is often impossible to get
- Annual caps on how many applications are processed and processing backlogs means that even those who qualify are waiting for years

As a result, many migrant care workers remain on restrictive permits or become undocumented.



When migrant care workers get permanent residency, they can get equal rights, and become nurses, personal support workers, childhood educators & healthcare professionals.





The current care workers program is about to expire, and the federal government is considering changes. Now is the time to take action for justice and fairness for care workers. Together, we can ensure the long-term strengthening of the care economy.
